News From the Chair

Workshop on youth representation in parliaments around the world

On September 12 and 13, 2022 the chair hosted an international workshop entitled: Youth without representation: Discovering the mechanisms behind youth's underbodies. representation in elected workshop attracted 21 scholars of all career stages from 12 different countries. It was the workshop's goal to look at representation holistically including the three steps in the nomination process - declaring candidacy, winning the party nomination, and being elected. We asked the following questions: where in the nomination process (i.e., the candidate selection process, the nomination process, and the election) is youth's discrimination the most pronounced. Is it more the parties or the system that disfavors youth? How strong is youth's unwillingness to run, and what factors condition this unwillingness? We will publish a selection of papers from the workshop in a special issue in *Electoral Studies*

The Chair hosts three guest researchers

Over the fall 2022, the chair hosted three guest researchers. Wolfgang Muno, Full Professor at the University of Rostock visited the chair to plan the summer school 2023 entitled Divisions, Reconciliation and Unity, which the chair will organize in conjunction with the University of Rostock and Ehwa University in South Korea. Steffen Kaillitz, Senior Lecturer at the Hannah Arendt Institute in Dresden visited the chair to advance a common research agenda in populism studies. Finally, Emilia Palonen from the University of Helsinki spent two weeks in Ottawa to advance a survey on open access publishing she and Professor Stockemer will conduct for the International Political Science Association (IPSR).
